4. SOCIAL INQUIRY

The Church denounces the contradiction that poverty, migration, inequality, corruption and injustice thrive in the Christian world brought up in the values of love of God and love of neighbor. Poverty and suffering destroy persons and families. Would it be possible to speak of a loving God in the midst of misery? For instance, millions of people leave their families for a better job in another country. Their children grow up with only one parent or with a relative, and the long separation of spouses is conducive to infidelity. The growing gap between the rich and the poor is the result of economic, social and political situations and structures, for which the church and the state require our peaceful collaboration to change.

Violence in the home is more common than outwardly realized, turning the home that ought to be a place of peace and love into a dangerous place for vulnerable family members: children, women, the sick and the elderly. Alcoholism and drug use can lead to violence, lies, adultery, lack of money, fighting and even the separation of spouses. Children suffer greatly to see the persons they love most in life fighting and separating. In separations, the practical problems of reorganizing the family into two are extremely devastating to all family members.

The present crisis caused by the decline of family and moral values is alarming. We cannot participate passively, by doing nothing, in the breakdown of the family, the institution in which persons who form the social fabric of the country live and grow. Protecting and strengthening the family is an urgent duty of both church and state.

"Migration is another sign of the times to be faced and understood in terms of its negative effects on family life. . . 4. SOCIAL INQUIRY

The institution of marriage and the family is the comprehensive setting for the growth and development of persons. In the family we receive the best attention, form permanent relationships and build our character. A united and stable family, despite its imperfections and limitations, strives to live a righteous life, promotes emotional support and preserves human values that are necessary for human stability.

Though troubled and broken families are a painful reality, there are also many other families who know how to face the challenges of family life by adapting to the new times with wisdom and courage and without losing essential values.

The family promotes essential moral and social values: respect for the dignity of each person; love of family; a sense of community that celebrates life; an appreciation God's gift of life and a concept of time that allows them to enjoy this gift. Furthermore, Catholic family is blessed with a firm love and devotion to our Blessed Mother Mary, who completes the family identity.

We are living in times of judgment and identity crisis, and we need human wisdom to have a clear concept of family to defend its essential values. Though the family has its problems, God takes care of its integrity.

John 2:1-11

On the third day a wedding took place at Cana in Galilee. Jesus' mother was there, ² and Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. ³ When the wine was gone, Jesus' mother said to him, "They have no more wine."

- ⁴ "Woman, why do you involve me?" Jesus replied. "My hour has not yet come."
- ⁵ His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you."

⁶ Nearby stood six stone water jars, the kind used by the Jews for ceremonial washing, each holding from twenty to thirty gallons. ⁷ Jesus said to the servants, "Fill the jars with water"; so they filled them to the brim. ⁸ Then he told them, "Now draw some out and take it to the master of the banquet."

They did so, ⁹ and the master of the banquet tasted the water that had been turned into wine. He did not realize where it had come from, though the servants who had drawn the water knew. Then he called the bridegroom aside ¹⁰ and said, "Everyone brings out the choice wine first and then the cheaper wine after the guests have had too much to drink; but you have saved the best till now."

¹¹ What Jesus did here in Cana of Galilee was the first of the signs through which he revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

4. SOCIAL INQUIRY

Jesus' presence and his first miracle at the wedding at Cana proclaims that marriage is blessed by God. Just as Jesus saved the celebration by changing water into wine, his presence in our marriage and our family gives a new significance to conjugal and family love.

Marriage is a permanent commitment which involves the total person—body, feeling, intellect and free will. It aims at a personal unity between two persons, a unity that leads to forming one body, heart and soul. God himself is the author of matrimony since he created man and woman as sexual persons, different and complementary, with an overwhelming mutual attraction that induces them to leave father and mother to become one flesh, in a lifelong union of love. The intimate love achieves its greatest realization in the marital relation, which the most complete human relation possible.

Although marriage is the normal option of most human beings, it is not necessarily the easiest path. It requires psychological maturity and a proven capacity to love another person for

life. Conjugal love is a special form of friendship that develops persons, in a union that normally results in creating a family through which humanity continues.

Marriage and the family require a true spirituality. Spirituality may sound like something separate from humanity, like life in a monastery. Others may think of spirituality as something opposed to sexuality and pleasure. Or it may mean sacrificing life on earth to gain eternal joy in heaven. True spirituality must be cleared of these incomplete meanings because it embraces all the spheres of human life for Jesus came to save the whole human being.

Christian spirituality is inspired by following Jesus. The source of Christian spirituality is a personal relationship with the three Divine Persons: the Son, the Holy Spirit and the Father—to converse with Jesus, to listen to the Holy Spirit and to enjoy the love of the all-powerful Father who understands us fully. Developing this personal relationship needs study, since one cannot love what one does not know, and prayer, speaking with God.

"In and among families, the Gospel message should always resound . . . "(AL, 58)

"The indissolubility of marriage--'what God has joined together, let no man put asunder' should not be viewed as a 'yoke' imposed on humanity, but as a 'gift' granted to those who are joined in marriage. . . 4. SOCIAL INQUIRY

In the Bible to "love yourself" is the foundation and measure of how to love others. Before assuming our respective roles in the family—father, mother, child, etc.—people are "selves." Thus the best way to build the family is by starting to build ourselves. This complex self-building involves self-knowledge, self-acceptance and self-love. Do I know myself, my talents and my limitations, whom I want to be and can be? Do I accept myself, my past and my present, and aim for a better future? Do I love myself and believe in my potential, love others and feel loved by others?

Making a plan to realize our vocation and utilizing our God-given talents and potential are essential. We must learn to diagnose our strengths and weaknesses, opportunities and challenges. We should set challenging, achievable and measurable goals for ourselves, both short-term and long-term, and work on achieving them. Finally, we should assess our goal achievement and work on higher goals with greater wisdom gained from experience and reflection

Our life vocation, which for most of us is marriage and family, is undoubtedly an essential life goal. God created us to be happy, and for that, he gave us intelligence and freedom. It is his will that we become fully responsible for our self-realization and life vocation by correctly choosing our distinctive way to live a full life.

"Each child has a place in God's heart from all eternity; once he or she is conceived, the Creator's eternal dream comes true." (*AL*, 168)

"We do well to remember that each one of us is a son or daughter. Even if one becomes an adult, or an elderly person, even if one becomes a parent, if one occupies a position of responsibility, underneath all of this is still the identity of a child. "In the family, we learn how to live as one. Perhaps we do not always think about this, but the family itself introduces fraternity into the world. From this initial experience of fraternity, nourished by affection and education at home, the style of fraternity radiates like a promise upon the whole society. . . In addition to the small circle of the couple and their children, there is the larger family, which cannot be overlooked. ...Friends and other families are part of this larger family, as well as communities of families who support one another in their difficulties, their social commitments and their faith." (*AL*, 194-196)

- In what ways do we as parents show our love for and our appreciation of our children?

b. Judge

- What modern means do we have to make it possible to know ourselves despite so many distractions and so much rush?
- Explain or illustrate: "Only if I decide to change myself, will my family and the world change."
- How has your parents' love for you influenced your understanding of God's love? How has becoming a parent changed your understanding of love?
- d. Act (Choose one action to work on this month.) *
 - Discuss with your spouse your self-knowledge has developed since you married.
 - If you haven't done so, set short-term and long-term goals for yourself and your family, by yourself or with your spouse.
 - Make the words "please," "thank you," and "sorry" a natural part of your family life and share how they strengthen the bonds of love in your family.
 - *You will report on your chosen action at the next meeting.

4. SOCIAL INQUIRY

"Marital love is above all a fully human love, that is, sensitive and spiritual at the same time. . . it is also primarily an act of free will, intended to stay and grow through the joys and sorrows of everyday life, so that husband and wife become one in heart and soul and together attain their human perfection." (*Humanae Vitae*, 9).

Sexuality is the expression of love which is a source of joy and pleasure in married life, with the capacity to transmit life, making couples co-creators with God.

A healthy and active sexual life does not happen by itself but must be cared for and cultivated. It is very important, for example, to know the functioning of the male body and the female body. Sexual maturity requires that the couple maintain a delicate and sincere dialogue of what the other prefers, expects and needs. To live a full sexual life is to stay healthy and attractive in order to win and love your partner every day. It is creating spaces of privacy and defending them without being invaded by children or overrun by the rush of daily life.

Friendship is based on an attraction and an understanding between spouses because they have an affinity of tastes, ways of being and life plans. Couples must learn to handle differences and conflicts through dialog, without aggression, where one yields at times and gives in at other times. Regardless of the feelings that come and go, true love means to commit oneself to the happiness of the other.

Amoris Laetitia

"Let us look at feelings and sexuality in marriage. "Desires, feelings, emotions . . . the passions, all have an important place in married life. They are awakened whenever 'another' becomes present and part of a person's life." (AL, 143)

"God himself created sexuality, which is a marvelous gift to his creatures. ... Sexual desire is not something to be looked down upon . . . Develop the habit of giving real importance to the other person. . . Keep an open mind. Don't get bogged down in your own limited ideas and opinions but be prepared to change or expand them. . . Show affection and concern for the other person. Love surmounts even the worst barriers. 4. SOCIAL INQUIRY

We live in an economically developed society that churns out multitudes of goods, both necessary and superfluous. Money has become the core life value, and powerful propaganda invites consumerism: buy, buy, buy. This ideology penetrates families; parents work long hours and have no time for the family, and children choose careers that make the most money.

What is God's plan for human activity? In the Old Testament God was an active worker during the metaphorical six days of creation. As God willed, man has the mission to work: "God took the man and put him in the garden to tend to it and take care of it." (*Genesis* 2:15) Because of sin, the meaning of work was destroyed, turning it into punishment: "By the sweat of your brow you shall eat bread." (*Genesis* 3:19)

In the New Testament, Jesus was a carpenter and a teacher, our supreme example of the worker. His parable of the talents reminds us that we should develop the gifts God has given us by working hard and gaining profit. The New Testament also teaches that sin destroys the meaning of work when making money is considered as the purpose of life: "You cannot serve both God and money." (Matthew 6:24)

Work is a fundamental value and is a form of self-realization, a means to live and a service to society. But work is also tedious, difficult and burdensome. The farmer who labors

under the hot sun is exhausted. The factory worker who tightens screws all day ends up angry and tired. The rich businessman who generates jobs for others cannot sleep because of company pressures.

Then there is unpaid work. The housewife does her household chores. Children have school as their first job, combining the joy of learning with the burden of getting up early, following rules, doing homework and tolerating difficult teachers. Volunteer service to the needy is another kind of work, teaching kindness and generosity. Sports, music, art and hobbies are forms of unpaid work, also requiring great effort and leading to personal development and enjoyment of life.

Parents work hard to ensure that their family can live with dignity, but work should not completely absorb them. They should give themselves time for family life. Children should learn the value of money learn to manage their allowance. They must also be responsible in school and develop in all aspects to become responsible adults.

Work is a medium of holiness that makes us like God, co-creators with him, teachers of humanity and educators in the faith. We have the obligation to develop our God-given talents that we may earn a good living for our families and share with others in need and to contribute to the progress of society. "To whom much is given, much will be required; and from the one who has been entrusted much, much more will be asked." (Luke 12:48)

a. Observe

- Is economic necessity the main reason for both parents to work outside the home?
- Are domestic helpers treated with respect and kindness and paid fairly?

4. SOCIAL INQUIRY

New times have led to a values crisis because of the rapidly changing world situation. To think of "the good old days" as the best times shows a lack of ability to adapt to reality. New values have become necessary, both positive and negative. Among the destructive values that have arisen in modern times are *relativism*, which rejects truth and morality because everything is relative; *individualism*, which leads to self-centeredness; and *consumerism*, which places accumulating material things as the main goal in life. Education in values has thus become very important, and the family is the first place where values are learned. "Even amid difficulties, often compounded today, of educational activities, parents should educate their children with confidence and courage in the essential values of human life." (*FC*, 37)

Familiaris Consortio points out five aspects of values education. First, parents should assure that their children can live a fully human life by developing the whole person—physically, emotionally, intellectually and spiritually. Next, parents must teach their children the value of life, especially now when the culture of death is increasingly seen in war, violence, abortion, euthanasia, destruction of nature and even in poverty. Third, parents should promote the social development of their children, teaching them interpersonal skills that they may relate effectively with others. Parents should also teach their children social responsibility, cultivating in them a sense of justice and genuine solidarity with the poor. Finally, parents must educate their children in the faith through religious instruction and family worship. (FC, 18-62)

Amoris Laetitia

"Parents always influence the moral development of their children, for better or for worse. It follows that they should take up this essential role and carry it out consciously, enthusiastically, reasonably, and appropriately." (*AL*, 259)

"When children realize that they have to be responsible for themselves, their self-esteem is enriched. This in turn teaches them to respect the freedom of others." (*AL*, 275)

4. SOCIAL INQUIRY

To have a home is our basic need and fundamental right. Do we own our home? Is it functional and suited to our needs? Do we keep it neat, orderly and beautiful? Do we love living in it? What are our plans and dreams for it?

Important as our material house is, more so is the internal organization of our home. A contented day-to-day living creates the environment of love and security essential in family life. Home organization is important to foster the harmonious coexistence, mutual support and overall development of persons. Through respect and dialog, family members reach minimum agreements which gradually become habits that lead to a favorable and happy "family spirit." Home is the place of safety, privacy and individuality, where we can be as we really are. Outside we may wear "masks" when we need to, but home is the place where we can behave naturally and spontaneously without fear of being misinterpreted.

The ideal of home organization is a balance between rules and flexibility. With this condition, the family functions harmoniously and everyone feels "at home" in an atmosphere of respect, affection, tolerance and sociability, with room for silence, privacy and prayer. It is natural that there will be disagreements, conflicts of interest, friction, etc., but effective home organization generates an intelligent handling of conflicts with a willingness to compromise and to forgive.

Power and authority are another vital area of family organization. When the children are young, parents have authority over them. But as children grow older, they should be involved in family decisions and management. Sharing responsibility develops their mental and social skills, enabling them to make wise decisions and to learn such values as independence, equality, lawfulness, dialog, freedom of expression, tolerance and others.

When only the nuclear family lives at home, tasks are more easily organized. However, when other persons such as grandparents or other extended family are part of the family home, they should be received with love and respect, appreciated for their contribution to family life. On their part, persons integrated into a nuclear family must be respectful of the internal dynamics of the home and adapt to its rules and customs.

Households with domestic helpers must reward them fairly, appreciate their work and treat them with respect and affection. The family has responsibility both for their economic welfare and their development as people.

4. SOCIAL INQUIRY

We live in an unjust and unequal world, where the majority of people live in poverty. "A study by the World Institute for Development Economics Research at United Nations University reports that the richest 1% of adults alone owned 40% of global assets in the year 2000, and that the richest 10% of adults accounted for 85% of the world total. The bottom half of the world adult population owned 1% of global wealth. (https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Distribution_of_wealth) It is possible to overcome poverty with the resources available in the world, but the selfishness and greed of man remain the greatest obstacles.

God's will is that all humanity live together as loving neighbors or as a big human family. However, this community is impossible without justice and peace. Jesus revealed his mission when he declared, "The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free, . . ." (Luke 4:18) As human beings we are directed to build a just society in which work generates wealth that is distributed evenly, in justice and peace, without destroying nature which is under our care.

Justice and peace begin in the family home where we experience and develop them since childhood.

"Founded on love and open to the gift of life, the family contains in itself the very future of society; its most special task is to contribute effectively to a future of peace. . .

Furthermore, true love always goes together with justice, so necessary for peace. It reaches out to those experiencing hardship: those who have no family, children who lack guidance and affection, the lonely and the outcast. The family which lives this love, however imperfectly, and opens itself generously to the rest of society, is the primary agent of a future of peace." (Pope John Paul II)

The sad reality about poverty and inequality in the world requires our sensitive response. We should be compassionate like Jesus who empathized with the sick, the sinners, the poor and the sorrowful. We should be educated in social justice, with the awareness that justice is imperative, not elective. We cannot be indifferent and insensitive to the suffering of the poor, but we must examine the causes of poverty to find real solutions. We must also have the same critical awareness that led Jesus to defy a religion that gave more importance to the law than to love and mercy.

Finally, we must learn to live in solidarity with the poor. Solidarity is not a trivial and transitory feeling towards our suffering neighbor, but it is an empathy with the poor in the spirit of brotherly love. "Solidarity is a firm and persevering determination to commit oneself to the common good, that is, for the good of each and every one, that we are all really responsible for all." (Pope John Paul II).

a. Observe

- Are Thai children taught to be in solidarity with the poor and to share their things with others?
- Do families around you teach and model social responsibility to their children?
- Are poverty and inequality a problem in Thailand, a country rich in natural resources?

b. Judge

- Is your family sensitive to the social problems of poverty and inequality and doing something to help the poor? Give an example.
- What can you do to raise awareness of social justice at home and in the workplace?
- Do you encourage your children to study and be successful, both to be rich and to share with others, especially the needy? How?

 - When a conflict arises at home, discuss and apply a peaceful solution to it.

4. SOCIAL INQUIRY

"Our Christian communities must become genuine schools of prayer, where the encounter with Christ is expressed not just in imploring help but also in thanksgiving, praise, adoration, contemplation, listening and ardent devotion, until we achieve the 'outburst of the heart." (Pope John Paul II)

Some people may think that prayer is for man to call upon a Higher Power (God) in times of need and to make requests: "that I may pass the exam; that I may find a good husband/wife; that I may be promoted in my job, that I may win the lottery! This is a wrong concept of prayer. The essence of prayer is to be in the presence of our loving God, full of faith, trust and love. Whoever wants to pray may pray—prayer is an intentional, loving and trusting encounter with God, essential in the life of a human being. It is not to put God in our plans but to put ourselves in God's plans.

In prayer God speaks. His word in the Bible is the main source of our prayer. The Holy Mass embodies this prayer: in the first half we hear two or three Bible readings; in the second half, we encounter and receive Jesus in the Holy Eucharist.

In prayer we listen. We pay attention to what God tells us in his word, through the Church and through the events of our life. We open ourselves to his word and put them to practice. Jesus is our model in this active and transforming prayer, focused on doing God's will. Through

prayer and dialog, God transforms us, gradually shaping us. Prayer is the action of God within us

How effective is prayer? We see God's power in the miracles granted through prayer, both in the Old and the New Testament: the escape of the Israelites from Egypt, the triumph of the shepherd boy David over the giant Goliath; Jesus' healing of the sick, the multiplication of the loaves and so on. Even today miracles are still happening, wrought through our prayer and our faith. Indeed, if we pray together in Jesus, we get whatever we ask in his name, and even more than we ask.

Familiaris Consortio

"Family prayer has for its very own object family life itself, which in all its varying circumstances is seen as a call from God and lived as a filial response to His call. Joys and sorrows, hopes and disappointments, births and birthday celebrations, wedding anniversaries of the parents, departures, separations and homecomings, important and far-reaching decisions, the death of those who are dear, etc.—all of these mark God's loving intervention in the family's history. (FC, 59)

"The fruitfulness of the Christian family in its specific service to human advancement, which of itself cannot help leading to the transformation of the world, derives from its living union with Christ, nourished by Liturgy, by self-oblation and by prayer." (*FC*, 62)

4. SOCIAL INQUIRY

No matter how imperfect life is, God is in control. Human beings imbued with a spiritual soul destined for an afterlife with the Creator has no reason to lose hope.

We all hope for happiness—as individuals, as families and as members of society. We have bright expectations for the future, as human beings on our way to perfection, so hope is as natural as the air we breathe. We have ideals to attain, defined in different ways by different religions, but all leading to a joyful afterlife or heaven. For us Christians, our destiny is eternal life with God because Jesus, God the Son, became man, suffered, died and rose from the dead, to save us.

To achieve our human goals, we need confidence in ourselves and support from others through recognition, affirmation and love. In Christian hope we center our trust in God, mighty, loving and merciful. God's presence changes our concept of hope because God never fails.

Because we are sinful and imperfect, hope requires patience with ourselves and others. True hope is active and creative; it is to work hard to overcome obstacles and to achieve the cherished objectives. Christian hope needs spiritual endurance, but it comes with joy and strength despite difficulties, a response to the Holy Spirit in us which moves us with a divine force.

Christian hope does not negate the concept of human hope but refines it. Hope is for all and achievable by all. For Christians, it is both a matter of reason and of faith, a virtue that begins and ends in God. It is the action of the Holy Spirit in all human beings. All of us hope, Christian or not.

We hope for a happy future for ourselves, for our families and for society.

Do we hope actively? Do we listen to the Holy Spirit within us? Are we working to make our hope a reality?

We hope for our children to live in a happy world. We hope that they find good life partners, that they live in a society where nature is cared for, where wars, fear and insecurity are minimized. We hope that they enjoy progress that does not create poverty and that they live as responsible members of the human family, recognizing the goodness and the fatherhood of God.
